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Teaching & Learning in Term 3

English

Over the course of this term students will read and view predictable, moderately complex texts, and sophisticated texts identifying representation, style and code and convention. They will navigate, view and read a range of printed and multimedia texts with an emphasis on informative texts. Students will respond to and compose descriptions, procedures and informative reports on a range of topics. Our spelling program will continue to follow the Soundwaves sequence. Mathematics

Last term 'Number Talks' was a hit with the students. Our staff have done some additional professional learning in numeracy and are ready to support our kids in their consolidation of whole number, addition, subtraction, multiplicative strategies and division. In class we will be exploring the key ideas in mathematics through a series of explicit teaching lessons and mathematical investigations, games and problem-solving activities. It's going to be a great semester of learning in numeracy!

Science

In Science this term students in K-2 will be exploring physical sciences by experimenting with pushing and pulling, floating and sinking and looking at how they relate to one another. Students will make objects move using ramps, levers, and pulleys. They will have the opportunity to construct their own Rube Goldberg machine using pushes and pulls.

Students in 3-6 will Investigate energy examining how it is created and how it is transferred and transformed. They will examine magnets and the force fields they create. Students will apply their understanding of energy and magnets to design and create a game that uses forces.

History

Students in K-2 will be investigating technologies of the past, present and how the change has influenced the way we live our lives.

Students in 3-6 will be exploring the different experiences of people living in Australia over time. The class will be investigating settlement patterns. They will examine the impact of settlement on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and study the everyday life of a variety of men and women in post-1800 colonial settlements using a range of sources from different experiences.

PDHPE

Students describe and practise ways respect, empathy and valuing diversity can positively influence respectful relationships. Examining the inquiry question of: Why are empathy, inclusion and respect important in our relationships?

Motivated by Ash Barty's win at Wimbledon, students will be participating in an in-school tennis program with Tom from Cooma Champs Tennis. During Friday afternoon sport, students will participate in invasion/territorial games. They will develop knowledge and understanding of offensive and defensive strategies while applying different movement skills.

Creative Arts

This term teaching and learning in creative arts will be focusing on dance. Students in K-2 will be perform dances with some understanding of body movement and expression, exploring a range of movements to make choices in order to convey ideas, feelings and moods. They will have an opportunity to describe the ideas, feelings and moods conveyed by dances.

In the 3-6 class will perform dances demonstrating a range of performance qualities and increasingly complex movement skills. They will explore the elements of dance in their own works and how these can be selected and combined to convey meaning. They will discuss the meaning and purpose of dance works and the roles of the creator and performer.
